<u>Bruce Springsteen</u>, also known as "the Boss", was born in 1949 in <u>New Jersey</u>, a state with a **gritty**, unglamourous, suburban image compared to the bright lights of neighbouring Manhattan. While generally rich, the state also has a strong working-class reputation which Springsteen captures well in his songs and <u>heartland rock</u>, a genre that focuses on blue-collar (white) workers with elements of <u>Americana</u> music (based on county, blues, folk, gospel and rock) and basic <u>rhythm and blues</u>.

One of his best-known songs is "<u>Streets of Philadelphia</u>", released in 1993 for the film "<u>Philadelphia</u>" which deals with the stigma faced by a successful lawyer (played by Tom Hanks) who gets AIDS. The song has a strong, **haunting** melody, and showing much compassion for all those left behind by the neoliberal capitalism of corporate America.

"Born in the USA" (1984) is one of Springsteen's best-known songs. It's strong, energetic beat and title make it sound like a patriotic anthem. But the lyrics are the exact opposite. The official video starts with workers pouring out of a refinery, and tells the story of a man who had trouble with the law and was sent to Vietnam – to kill the "yellow man".

Gritty = abrasive, tough (grit=sand, granules/strength, spirit); haunting = recuring, obsessive, unforgettable

Born down in a dead man's town
The first kick I took was when I hit the ground
You end up like a dog that's been beat too much
'Til you spend half your life just coverin' up

Born in the U.S.A I was born in the U.S.A...

Got in a little hometown jam

So they put a rifle in my hand Sent me off to a foreign land To go and kill the yellow man

Born in the U.S.A / I was born in the U.S.A...

Come back home to the refinery **Hiring man** says, "Son **if it was up to me**"

Went down to see my **V.A. man**He said, "Son, don't you understand"

I had a brother at Khe Sanh
Fighting off the Viet Cong
They're still there, he's all gone
He had a woman he loved in Saigon
I got a picture of him in her arms now

Down in the shadow of the penitentiary
Out by the gas fires of the refinery
I'm ten years burning down the road
Nowhere to run ain't got nowhere to go

Born in the U.S.A
I was born in the U.S.A. now
Born in the U.S.A
I'm a long gone Daddy in the U.S.A. now
Born in the U.S.A...
I'm a cool rockin' Daddy in the U.S.A. now

When I hit the ground = (here) when I was born 'Til you spend half your life just coverin' up = Until you spend half you life just covering up [your pain]

Got in a little hometown jam: to get into a jam = to get into trouble (here, in the hometown, with the police probably)

Hiring man = the person who recruits
"if it was up to me" = if I had the authority

V.A. man = veteran affairs man

Khe Sanh = a battle in the Vietnam War Viet Cong = pro-communist fighters in South Vietnam

Down in the shadow... refinery = living near the prison and the refinery
Burning down the road = maybe? Being on the road, not being in any fixed place
