

Library Services

The Paris 1 **SCD** (Service Commun de la Documentation) comprises several libraries :

- <u>Bibliothèque de l'École des arts de la Sorbonne</u> (Fine Arts Library): Aesthetics, cinema, architecture, design, art history, cultural studies, syllabus for the CAPES and Agrégation examinations in the visual arts
- <u>Bibliothèque Ernest-Lavisse</u>: For students preparing for the agrégation in history or geography, or the CAPES in history and geography
- Bibliothèque François-Cuzin : Philosophy, sociology
- <u>Bibliothèque Jacques-Lagroye</u>: International relations, political communication, gender studies, political sociology
- <u>Bibliothèque Jean-Claude-Colliard</u>: Law, social law and social studies, international and European law and legal doctoral studies
- <u>Bibliothèque Pierre-Mendès-France</u>: Political science, economics and management, humanities (philosophy, history, geography, art, archaeology, social sciences), computer and information sciences

Other <u>libraries associated</u> with the Common Documentation Services are available to you, depending on your level of study: here's an <u>interactive</u> map to help you find them. Click on the links for more information.

In Paris 1 libraries, you can:

• Enter by scanning the barcode on your student or reader card;



- Locate documents using the Mikado discovery tool, accessible from a computer or smartphone;
- Read magazines or books;
- Borrow and return books through self-service machines using your student card;
- Use a computer;
- Work independently in the library or collaborate in a reserved group study room;
- Print, scan and photocopy;
- Relax on Fatboys or sofas while enjoying magazines!

If you would like to learn how to use any of these services, consult the following user guides:

Readers account and loan renewal

- 1. Log in to Mikado from your ENT;
- 2. At the top-right corner of the home page, click on "Compte Lecteur" (Reader account);
- 3. View your current loans by clicking on "Voir et prolonger mes emprunts" (View and renew my loans)
- 4. Check the boxes next to the items you wish to renew, then click on "Prolonger la sélection" (Extend Selection).

Your loans will be extended for an additional 7 days. Please note that extensions can only be made once per loan and only if the loan is not overdue.

You can also check your reader account and renew your loans using the self-service machines available in certain libraries (PMF, Colliard, École des Arts).



Print

- ➤ École des Arts de la Sorbonne, Jean-Claude-Colliard and Pierre-Mendès-France Libraries : These libraries use the same copying system. You can make copies using your student card or external reader card (see instructions below).
- François-Cuzin and Jacques-Lagroye Libraries: Black-and-white printing only. Printing is free of charge, but paper is not provided.

1. Top up your credit:

- Log in to your digital workplace (ENT) and click on the "Impressions" (Prints) tab;
- Click on "Recharge crédit bibliothèque" (Recharge Library Credit) tab;
- Select an amount and click on the blue Paybox icon;
- Enter your bank details to complete the transaction.

2. Start printing:

 Upload your documents to your digital workplace (ENT) or print directly from one of the library's computers.

3. Print:

- Place your student card to the area indicated on the printer;
- Select the "Impression" (Print) icon;
- Select the document(s) you wish to print;
- Press "Imprimer" (Print);
- Don't forget to log out after printing!

Start printing (detail of step 2)

From your own computer

Log in to your ENT and click on the "Impressions" (Prints) tab;



- Click on "Soumission des travaux" (Upload your files) from the menu :
- Click "Parcourir" (Browse) to select the PDF document you wish to print, then click Soumettre (Download).

From a library computer (recommended)

- Open the document you need to print;
- Click Fichier/Imprimer (File/Print);
- Select the format and colour if necessary;
- Click the "Print button" and select your Toshiba printer.

Wireless network

There are two ways to connect to the Paris 1 Wi-Fi network:

1) Eduroam Wi-Fi network

- To connect to the Eduroam network, download and install eduroam CAT on your smartphone, tablet or computer;
- In the list of institutions, select 'Université Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne' and complete the installation.

Once set up, this tool will allow you to automatically connect to the Eduroam network at any participating university or higher education institution, both in France and internationally.

2) univ-paris1.fr Wi-Fi network

- If you do not have Eduroam installed, you can choose 'universiteparis1';
- Enter your Paris 1 login and password.



Antidote

Some SCD library computers are equipped with a spell-checking software that works in both English and French: **Antidote**.

Antidote is designed for everyone: from those who want to **improve their** writing, to individuals with **dyslexia**, and especially for **users whose first language is not French**. It's easy to use: just open your word processor and type your text. Then, **click on the 'Antidote' menu** in the top right corner, followed by the 'Corrector' option.

Antidote offers **three main tools** to help correct and enhance your text: the **Language** section, which checks for French grammar and conjugation errors; the **Typography** section, which focuses on punctuation mistakes; and the **Style** section, which helps improve the overall quality of your writing.

Once you select a menu, the errors will appear in the right-hand pane along with suggested corrections. Click on any error in your text to view a tooltip with the correction and an explanation. **To apply the correction**, simply click 'Correct'. The Style menu helps you identify repetitive phrases, redundant expressions, and vocabulary, making your text more readable and inclusive. For example, in the Repetition menu, Antidote will highlight terms you've used multiple times. By selecting a term, you'll see a 'Synonym' option that provides alternative words to diversify your vocabulary and improve your writing.

Sainte Geneviève Library

Multidisciplinary library.



Documents can be consulted on site. No loans.

Open from Monday to Saturday from 10 to 22h and on certain Sundays during term time from 13h to 19h.

The BSG is located in the 5th arrondissement, 10 place du Panthéon. Access : Metro 10 Maubert Mutualité ; RER B Luxembourg / St. Michel or buses 84, 89, 82, 38, 27, 21, 85.

Sainte Barbe Library

Multidisciplinary library.

You can borrow documents.

Open Monday to Saturday from 10am to 8pm and some Sundays. Sundays during term time from 13h00 to 19h00.

The BSB is located in the 5th arrondissement at 4 rue Valette. Access: Metro station 10 Maubert Mutualité; RER B Luxembourg / St Michel or Bus 63, 87, 86.

National Library of France

Multidisciplinary library.

Documents can be consulted on site. No loans.

Admission free from 17h. Open Tuesday to Saturday from 10am to 8pm and Sunday from 1pm to 7pm.

The BnF is located in the 13th arrondissement, on Quai François Mauriac. Access: Metro 14, RER C Bibliothèque François Mitterrand; Metro 6 Quai de la gare or buses 89, 62, 64, 132, 325.



Public Information Library

The BPI is temporarily closed. Reopening at Lumière on August 25 2025, 40 avenue des Terroirs de France (12e)

Multidisciplinary library.

Documents can be consulted on the premises. No loans.

Open Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, Friday from 12.00 to 22.00; Saturday and Sunday from 10.00 to 22.00. Closed on Tuesdays.

The Bpi is located in the 4th arrondissement at 1 rue Beaubourg. Access: Metro Rambuteau (11), Hôtel de Ville (1, 11), Châtelet (1, 2, 4, 7, 11); RER A/B Châtelet or buses 29, 38, 47, 75.

University Library of Languages and Civilisations

Library specialising in languages and civilisations.

You can borrow documents.

Open from Monday to Saturday from 10 am to 10 pm.

The BULAC is located in the 13th arrondissement at 65 rue des Grands Moulins. How to get there: Metro 14, RER C Bibliothèque François Mitterrand; tramway 3a Avenue de France or buses 27, 62, 64, 132, 89, 25, 71, 325.
