

In English, there is no future tense in the same way as in French.

But there are several ways of expressing the future.

1/ "will" + the base form of the verb (i.e. the infinitive without "to") is used:

- i) to make general predictions about the future.
Tomorrow it will rain.
During the holidays, I will see some movies/films.
- ii) "will" is also used to express an immediate action. *It is hot in here. I will open the window.*

2/ "going to" is used to express intentions.

This afternoon, I am going to buy a pair of boots. Then, in the evening, I'm going to see a friend.

3/ The present progressive can also be used for arrangements: i.e. actions which are already well planned in the future, especially if you know the time and place.

Céline is spending Christmas in her husband's family, in Dinard.

4/ Lastly, the present simple is used for timetables (for trains, etc.) and schedules.

The next train leaves for Brussels at 10:34 am.
