

## Libraries

The joint library service (**SCD**) includes eight integrated libraries.

- **Sorbonne School of Arts Library (Saint-Charles Center)**: visual arts and art studies.

**Address:** 47 rue des Bergers, 75015 Paris – 2nd floor, room 260

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. Accredited external readers

**Opening hours:** 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday to Friday, and Saturday morning from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

- **Ernest-Lavissee Library (Sorbonne Center)**: preparation for the Agrégation exams in history, geography, or the CAPES in history-geography.

**Address:** 17 Rue de la Sorbonne, 75005 Paris

**Access:** Reserved for students enrolled in teaching exam preparation in history and geography at Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne, Sorbonne University, and Université Paris Cité

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- **François-Cuzin Library (Sorbonne Center)**: research-level library specialized in philosophy (philosophy, sociology, CAPES and Agrégation programs).

**Address:** 17 Rue de la Sorbonne, 75005 Paris – Staircase C, 1st floor

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. For students, access from third year (L3) onward

**Opening hours:** Monday to Thursday, 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

- **Hélène-Ahrweiler Library (La Chapelle Center)**: specialized in humanities and social sciences.

**Address:** 1 avenue de la Porte de la Chapelle – Ground floor entrance

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. Accredited external readers

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- **Jacques-Lagroye Library (Sorbonne Center)**: research-level library specialized in political science: international relations, political communication, gender studies, political sociology.

**Address:** Entrance at 14 rue Cujas – Office H611 (staircase K)

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. For students, access from third year (L3) onward

**Opening hours:** Monday to Thursday, 9:30 a.m. to 7 p.m., Friday 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

- **Jean-Claude-Colliard Library (Lourcine Center)**: study and research library specialized in law.

**Address:** 1 Rue de la Glacière, 75013 Paris

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. For students, the study section is open to all levels and the research section to students enrolled in Master's (M2) and PhD programs. Accredited external readers, Saturdays only

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- **Pierre-Mendès-France Library (Pierre-Mendès-France Center)**: economics, management, mathematics, and computer science.

**Address:** 31 rue Baudricourt, 75013 Paris

**Access:** University community of Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. Accredited external readers

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6:45 p.m.

Some twenty libraries associated to the SCD and other inter-university libraries are also open to the university's students. You will find [here](#) an interactive map to help you locate them. Click on each link for more information.

In Paris 1 libraries, you can :

- Enter by scanning the barcode on your student or reader card ;
- Locate documents using the Mikado discovery tool, accessible from a computer or smartphone ;
- Read magazines or books ;
- Borrow and return books through self-service machines using your student card ;

- Use a computer ;
- Work independently in the library or collaborate in a reserved group study room ;
- Print, scan and photocopy ;
- Relax on Fatboys or sofas while enjoying magazines !

If you would like to learn how to use any of these services, consult the following user guides:

### Readers account and loan renewal

1. Log in to Mikado from your ENT ;
2. At the bottom of the left sidebar, click on **Compte Lecteur** (*Reader account*) ;
3. View your current loans by clicking on **Prolonger la section** (*Extend your selection*) ;
4. Your loans will be extended for an additional 7 days. Please note that extensions can only be made once per loan and only if the loan is not overdue.

You can also check your reader account and renew your loans using the self-service machines available in certain libraries (PMF, Colliard, École des Arts).

### Print

**Hélène-Ahrweiler, Pierre-Mendès-France, Jean-Claude-Colliard, and École des Arts de la Sorbonne Libraries** : these libraries use the same copying system. You can make copies using your student card or external reader card.

**François-Cuzin and Jacques-Lagroye Libraries** : these libraries offer black-and-white printing only. Printing is free of charge, but paper is not provided.

#### 1. Top up your credit :

- Log in to your ENT and click on the **Impressions** (*Prints*) tab ;
- Click the **Recharge crédit bibliothèque** (*Recharge Library Credit*) tab ;
- Select an amount and click on the blue **Paybox icon** ;
- Enter your bank details to complete the transaction.

#### 2. Start printing :

- Upload your documents to your ENT or print directly from one of the BU computers.

### 3. Print :

- Take your student card to the area indicated on the printer ;
- Select the Impression (Print) icon ;
- Select the document(s) you wish to print ;
- Press Imprimer (Print) ;
- Log out after printing.

### Start printing (detail of step 2)

#### From your own computer

- Log in to your ENT and click on the Impressions (Prints) tab ;
- Click on Soumission des travaux (Download Jobs) from the menu ;
- Click Parcourir (Browse) to select the PDF document you wish to print, then click Soumettre (Download).

#### From a library computer (recommended)

- Open the document you need to print ;
- Click **Fichier/Imprimer** (*File/Print*) ;
- Select the format and colour if necessary ;
- Click the **Print** button and select your **Toshiba** printer.

### Connecting to Wi-Fi

There are two ways to connect to the Paris 1 Wi-Fi network:

#### 1) Eduroam Wi-Fi network

- To connect to the Eduroam network, download and install **eduroam CAT** on your smartphone, tablet or computer ;
- In the list of institutions, select 'Université Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne' and complete the installation.

Once set up, this tool will allow you to automatically connect to the Eduroam network at any participating university or higher education institution, both in France and internationally.

## 2) univ-paris1.fr Wi-Fi network

- If you do not have Eduroam installed, you can choose '**universite-paris1**' ;
- Enter your Paris 1 login and password.

## Antidote software

Some SCD library computers are equipped with **powerful spell-checking software** that works in both English and French: **Antidote**.

Antidote is designed for everyone: from those who want to improve their writing, to individuals with dyslexia, and especially for users whose first language is not French.

It's easy to use : simply open your word processor and type your text. Then, click on the '**Antidote**' menu in the top right corner, followed by the '**Corrector**' option.

Antidote offers three main tools to help correct and enhance your text: the **Language** section, which checks for French grammar and conjugation errors ; the **Typography** section, which focuses on punctuation mistakes ; and the **Style** section, which helps improve the overall quality of your writing.

Once you select a menu, the errors will appear in the right-hand pane along with suggested corrections. Click on any error in your text to view a tooltip with the correction and an explanation. To apply the correction, simply click '**Correct**'.

The **Style** menu helps you identify repetitive phrases, redundant expressions, and vocabulary, making your text more readable and inclusive. For example, in the **Repetition** menu, Antidote will highlight terms you've used multiple times. By selecting a term, you'll see a '**Synonym**' option that provides alternative words to diversify your vocabulary and improve your writing.

You can also borrow an Antidote Web license for the duration of your choice. No need to go to the library anymore : you can set up the application on your computer according to your needs! Licenses are available in both French and English.

Don't forget that you have access to many other libraries academic and public libraries. Here is a selection of Parisian libraries that are open evenings and weekends :

**Sainte-Barbe Library (BSB)**: multidisciplinary library.

**Access:** Students from L1 to M2, as well as CPGE and BTS students from public institutions in Paris and the Île-de-France region  
**Opening hours:** Monday to Saturday, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Open on some Sundays (during exam periods)  
**Loans:** Free for students; fee-based (€34) for teachers, researchers, and staff

**Sainte-Geneviève Library (BSG)**: multidisciplinary library.

**Address:** 10 place du Panthéon, 75005 Paris  
**Access:** 18+ or holders of a high school diploma  
**Opening hours:** Monday to Saturday, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Open on some Sundays (during exam periods)  
**Loans:** No lending, on-site consultation only

**Public Information Library (Bpi)**: multidisciplinary public library offering a constantly updated selection of French and international collections of general and current information.

**Address:** 40 avenue des Terroirs de France (Lumière building), 75012 Paris  
**Access:** Open to everyone, free of charge  
**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 12 p.m. to 10 p.m., weekends and public holidays from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Closed on Tuesdays  
**Loans:** No lending, on-site consultation only

**University Library of Languages and Civilizations (Bulac)**: university library specializing in languages written in non-Latin scripts.

**Address:** 65 rue des Grands Moulins, 75013 Paris

**Access:** Open to all, free of charge, upon registration

**Opening hours:** Monday to Saturday from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

**Loans:** Depending on user status. Free borrowing available for Paris 1 students

**Cujas Interuniversity Library**: interuniversity library specializing in law, economics, and political science.

**Address:** 2 rue Cujas, 75005 Paris

**Access:**

- **[Paris 1 and Paris 2 Universities]:** from L2 for students in law, economics, management, and political science (exception: from L1 for Paris 1 IED); from M1 for students in history, geography, sociology, and philosophy
- **[Other institutions]:** from M1 for students in economics, management, and political science; from PhD level for students in history, geography, sociology, or philosophy

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

**Loans:** Free for Paris 1 and Paris 2 students and PhD candidates; on-site consultation only up to M2 for students from other institutions

**Sorbonne Interuniversity Library (BIS) – Sorbonne Site**: interuniversity library specializing in literature and humanities, primarily intended for researchers.

**Address:** 17 rue de la Sorbonne, 75005 Paris

**Access:** From L3 for Paris 1 students in certain disciplines (for others, from L3 or M1 depending on profile)

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. (except Thursday from 12 p.m.), Saturday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

**Loans:** Free

**Sorbonne Interuniversity Library (BIS) – Geography Site:** interuniversity library specializing in human geography, territorial sciences, environment, urban planning, geopolitics, tourism, and cartography.

**Address:** 191 rue Saint-Jacques, 75005 Paris (2nd floor of the Institute of Geography)

**Access:** Free from L3 for Paris 1 students with coursework in geography or enrolled in preparation programs for the Agrégation or CAPES in history and geography, or in a MEEF master's program

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. (except Thursday from 12 p.m.), Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

**Loans:** Possible and free depending on the type of document

**National Library of France (BnF) – François-Mitterrand Site:** site composed of two libraries: a public library and a research library.

**Address:** Quai François Mauriac, 75013 Paris

**Public library:**

**Access:** Open to all from age 14; free from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. (€15 pass for under 26)

**Opening hours:** Tuesday to Saturday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Sunday from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Closed on Monday

**Loans:** No lending, on-site consultation only

**Research library:**

**Access:** Proof of research required; Research Pass (€55/year)

**Opening hours:** Tuesday to Saturday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m.

**Loans:** No lending, on-site consultation only

**National Library of France (BnF) – Richelieu Site (Oval Room):** reading room offering more than 20,000 works on comics, art history, architectural and written heritage, as well as dictionaries, encyclopedias, works on French history and genealogy, and a corpus of over 2,000 works of French literature.

**Address:** 5 rue Vivienne, 75002 Paris

**Access:** Open to all, free of charge

**Opening hours:** Wednesday to Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Closed on Monday

**Loans:** No lending, on-site consultation only

**Sorbonne Nouvelle Library (BSN)**: university library for arts, literature, languages, and humanities and social sciences.

**Address:** 8 avenue de Saint-Mandé, 75012 Paris

**Access:** Open to all from high school level (Première) upon presentation of ID

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. From May 2: Monday to Saturday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

**Loans:** Depending on user status. Paris 1 students can obtain a borrowing card for a fee (€17 for 6 months, €34 for one year)

**Grands Moulins University Library (BGM)**: specialized in sciences, arts, literature, humanities, and social sciences.

**Address:** 5 rue Thomas Mann, 75013 Paris

**Access:** Free upon registration for students outside Paris Cité

**Opening hours:** Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., Saturday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

**Loans:** Fee-based (€34) for students outside Paris Cité

The [libraries in the Paris municipal network](#) also have study rooms and many useful services : you don't need a library card to access them !
